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# **"OLD MAN" AND THE SEA**



Ironman legend Dean Mercer turned back time yesterday, leaving even the most cynical on the beach daring to dream that perhaps there is a chance for a fairytale farewell.

At 39, Mercer, who first won the Aussie Ironman title 20 years ago, left a top-class field in his wake winning his opening heat by more than 100 metres.

In his final shot at the title, Mercer looked awesome, taking the lead in the opening ski leg, before putting the issue beyond doubt with a magical piece of body surfing that drew gasps from the crowd and left him well in front going into the final board leg.

"It's good to get a wave like that, makes you look a bit better than you are sometimes as well, but it was nice," Mercer said

As Mercer crossed the finish line with minor placegetters Manly's Jonathon Stock and Northcliffe's Nathan Smith still at sea, his mind wondered to another day when the order was ski, swim, board. "You know it's the same order as it was 20 years ago when I won, it's funny coming here and the perspective 20 years gives, there's no pressure, I'm just having a lot of fun."

A dual winner of the event, Mercer later won his quarter-final, putting him through to

today's semis at a beach that is likely to produce conditions which suit his strengths.

"There is not much of a run, once you hit the water you are straight into it because the bank isn't very long so it sets up well for me," he said.

Add to that the predicted two metre swells across the weekend and suddenly a Dean Mercer victory, while improbable, is far from impossible.

"Zane (Holmes) and Shannon (Eckstein) deserve to be the favourites but if there's surf then it opens things up. That said, the cream usually rises to the top and the better guys tend to make it through, I'd like to think I'm still one of the better guys."

Asked who were the best he has seen in 20 years at the top, Dean was definite. "Trevor Hendy was the best ever in the shorter events, in the Kellogg's Nutri-Grain you can't go past my brother Darren. Over the years I managed to beat everyone else in those events but never Darren, he was too good."

The thought of the generational change taking place with Darren's daughter Jordan winning her first Aussie gold at these championships also bought a smile to her uncle's face. "She's got the genes, fast over the sand and you know when she paddles a board she looks just like her dad, its uncanny how the style is the same."

Northcliffe craft legend Bruce Kolkka was on hand to be inducted into the SLSA Hall of Fame, joining more than 60 other individual and team greats.

SLSA's highest award for bravery, the Meritorious Award-Silver medallion, went to Brock Curtis-Mathew, of Wollongbar, NSW, a non-member of SLSA, for his actions at Lighthouse Beach, Ballina in 2008, when he attempted to rescue his friend Peter Edmonds, who had been fatally attacked by a large shark.

Major James (Jim) Peryman from North Cronulla SLSC, was posthumously recognised for his actions in 1950 at North Cronulla, when he rescued a 16-year-old girl caught in a treacherous rip. Tragically Jim was drowned due to the weight of seaweed on his line during the rescue.

A presentation of the Meritorious Awards will be made in the Championships Amphiteatre at 10am today, while awards to the DHL Lifeguard, Lifesaver, Club of the Year and Coach, Official and Athlete of the Year will take place at 11am.

# THE FAST AND THE FURIOUS

#### The Scarborough amphitheatre is once again set to come alive for the very popular beach flags finals this afternoon.

The beach flags have become a real crowd favourite at the Aussies and the beachfront will be at capacity to see if Simon Harris (Northcliffe) and Melissa Howard (Kurrawa) can defend their Aussies titles.

Harris, who will be aiming for his record-equalling seventh beach flags title, is in good form after yesterday's heats and semi-finals.

"The form is pretty good. When I get it right, it's pretty comfortable, so I'm really happy with that. It's about surviving; you've only got to win once."

"If I win that will make seven, which equals the record, I'd be rapt with that, really rapt."

Local hopes will rest with Tom Nolan and Todd Edwards, both from North Cottesloe, and Nolan is looking forward to his first open final after taking out the under-19 crown last year.

"There are a lot of really good flaggers in there so I'm going to go out there and do the best I can and see how I will go, it will be very hard and fast," Nolan said.

"The amphitheatre will be full and they'll be cheering really loud, not only North Cott, but the other WA clubs, we seem to come together and cheer for each other. I'm very excited."

Harris, Nolan and Edwards will be taking on Christopher Stewart (Alexandra Heads), Aaron Stubbs, Paul Cracroft-Wilson and Morgan Foster (all Kurrawa) and Daniel Rye (Emu Park) in the final.

In the open women's flag final Howard will have to overcome Australian team representative Cara Langendam (Bulli) and a host of other beach sprint stars. Other starters in the final are Davina Strauss (Coledale), Catherine Donaldson (Kurrawa), Hayley Atkins (Anglesea), Elly Graff (Cronulla), Emma Rynne (Northcliffe) and WA local Renee McCabe (Scarboro).

As for Grant Baldock's tip (SLSA General Manager, Surf Sports) he will be backing the favourite.

"I think for the male Simon Harris will be hard to beat and in the female Cara Langendam will take the gold," Baldock said.

Flags action will start at 3.30pm and from 3pm there will be entertainment from Telstra Road To Tamworth winner Morgan Evans and his band.

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What followed was just as extraordinary as the once-in-a-summer mistake from the three-time defending champions.

"It was just one of those things, completely my fault, I made a mistake, got the oar in the wrong position and it took us six or seven strokes to straighten things up, by that stage we were well and truly last," said sweep Jack Alliss.

"I thought the boys would want to throttle me, but gee they are good, I told them we were last and they just said, 'oh well we'll peg them back one at a time', and that's what they did."

Indeed the champion crew clawed back to second place at the turn and then, to the cheers of clubmates, pulled themselves over the top of a swell to shoot clear and win by five boat lengths.

"Did you see that, they gave them five start and won by five ... it's unbelievable!," screamed one fellow boatie in awe.

By day's end North Cottesloe were through to today's fourth round but Alliss was keen to avoid the hype of a history making fourth successive open boat title.

"These boys have been around a long time and not one of them is talking about four in a row," he said.

"Sure it would be nice, it would be amazing, but we are just not talking about it.

"I know it sounds like a cliché, taking things as they come and all that, but it's true, we just have to go about our work and get to the final, we honestly have not mentioned it."

# **EMMA'S FIRST**

## Nothing could diminish Emma McKenzie's smile as her Scarborough success continued with her first open Aussie gold in the women's belt.

The 18-year-old had already taken gold in the under-19 Champion Lifesaver and silver as part of the Alexandra Headland team in the patrol championship, but the belt was a like a bolt from the blue.

"It's just amazing, I can't believe it, I'm so stoked," Emma said.

In tough conditions with a heavy chop, Emma had no idea she had won until she got back to the beach.

"The chop was so big I could only see the person next to me, I just had to put my head down and get to the can as fast as I could. My team-mates reckon I won by about 10 yards but I've got no idea."

Emma's mum was one of the first on the beach.

"It was really great, she was just stoked and said it was great for all the hard work I put in."

In only the second year the event has been contested, North Cronulla's Lucy Mahoney was second with Cronulla's Jessica Lauricella third.

Emma later picked up a silver in the under-19 Tube Rescue and bronze in the Open Tube Rescue, taking her tally so far to two gold, two silver and a bronze.

The Open Tube Rescue gold was won by Northcliffe's Eloise Van Gysen, Flora Manciet, Kelly Jury and Jessica Walker with City of Perth taking silver.

• In other results, Northcliffe's Pierce Leonard, Zane Holmes, and Shannon Eckstein combined to win the board relay. The same trio then joined Nathan Smith to take Gold in the surf teams, giving Holmes his third gold medal in as many events.

Eckstein then matched his club mate in the gold medal count by taking out the restricted surf race.

• Cronulla's Zak Abdallaoui won the under-17 surf belt from Ryan O'Grady of Bulli and Freshwater's Jordan Burden.

• The Collaroy team of Bart Louis, Kendrick Louis, and Patrick Nicol won the under19 board relay from Warilla/Barrack Point with Burleigh Heads/Mowbray Park third. The WBP team held a strong lead into the final leg but Nicol produced an amazing paddle to catch his rival and win the sprint up the beach.

In all three races he was professionally quick off the beach and never headed. As for his chances on Sunday, with the swell tipped to lift, luck and experience will play their part.

"I saw it Wednesday when the swell was big, I stayed up in the hotel to avoid getting cooked in the sun at my age, but as usual the doctor (Fremantle doctor) gets up and impacts the runs, it can get pretty interesting," Robinson said.

Asked how long he could go on winning at the highest level Robinson was circumspect.

"Internationally I'm concentrating on the longer kayak races these days, as for surf I just love paddling, love coming down and being with my mates but with other things like family and all that's important in life I will have to think about it."

Pressed on when that would be, Robinson gave a smile and suggested it may be "sooner rather than later", whenever the time comes you can rest assured "the man" will go out on his terms, more than likely as a winner.
